


We travel a lot. All of us — Klaus, Morten and myself — are in total travelling some 350-400 days every year.


This year I was joined by my long-time friend Hans Bertlin and two newcomers to the aluminium industry and to KUBAL.





Jilin Carbon Co. Changchun Branch Update

In 2008 the Changchun cathode facility which supplies *simonsen* with graphitic blocks among others CCB-3 (30% semi-graphitic cathode) has embarked on a large modernisation of its production facilities. The modernisation of the plant includes:

- a new automated solids/liquids batching system
- a new vibro-compaction unit
- a new cathode machining facility
- a dedicated packing and storage warehouse



The total project will be completed by the fourth quarter of 2008 and deliveries resuming by the end of 2008.



We have now introduced a procedure which means that every March and September our datasheets will be updated based upon any possible change informed to us us from our suppliers.

In case of important changes we shall of course keep you informed directly — however we don't expect this to ever happen.



on "our" hole number 11 for playing their first ball on this new course. See the photo above.




The Sea Stallion

A Viking ship, a dream – and an enormous challenge. The Sea Stallion from Glendalough has sailed across the North Sea to Dublin in 2007 and returning to Roskilde in 2008 via the Limfjord. The voyage has marked the climax of the project known as Thoroughbred of the Sea, the most ambitious ship archaeology research project ever undertaken. His Royal Highness Crown Prince Frederik was patron of the expedition.

The Sea Stallion from Glendalough is a reconstruction of the 30-meter-long warship exhibited in the Viking Ship Museum. Representing the pinnacle of Viking technology, she is one of the ocean-going longships whose praise is sung in sagas and skaldic verse. The original vessel was built by Vikings in Dublin and ended her days in the late 11th century when she was scuttled to block Roskilde Fjord.


The Sea Stallion from Glendalough was built at the museum's boatyard in 2000-2004. She was built with replicas of Viking tools, using the same methods and materials as in the original ship and the result is spectacular. Form, function and aesthetics are taken to a higher level in synergy with the materials and traditional craftsmanship. A design that was admired and revered a thousand years ago and continues to attract attention to this very day. The ship is among the twelve representatives of outstanding Danish design and craftsmanship singled out in the Cultural Canon recently compiled by the Danish Minister for Culture.

The Sea Stallion from Glendalough was to be sent on this expedition to the very same waters her ancestor crossed – the North and Irish Seas. The purpose of the voyage was to test and document the seaworthiness, speed and manoeuvrability of the ship on the rough open sea and in coastal waters with treacherous currents. The crucial question was how the long, narrow, flexible hull would withstand the onslaught of ocean waves. The expedition not only allowed a test of the ship herself, but also provided valuable new information on Viking longships and society.






The ship was manned by members of the Viking Ship Museum staff and 120 volunteers who took turns in joining the 70-man crew. The project also casted new light on the organisation necessary for a crew to function satisfactorily, both aboard the vessel and on land. In addition, the expedition was an interesting social experiment – how would 70 present-day individuals react to being confined to an open-decked ship, with little room for private life or home comforts, on the open seas, where anything could happen. The voyage thus provided new insights into the hearts, minds and spirits of the Vikings – while teaching us a thing or two about ourselves.

I can inform you that the trip from Ireland to Denmark went very well and that the ship averaged some 7 knots per hour which is quite impressive. One must conclude that the vikings were not amateurs when it came to shipbuilding.

In celebration of the building of the "Sea Stallion" and the successful trip to Ireland and back again via England and Holland the Royal Mint has issued a limited number of coins with a value of DKK 20.– approx. 2.70 Euros. Probably the first time a coin was ever made with a viking ship as motif.

When Christian Bjornskov is lecturing at international conferences abroad people always ask him "Is it really true that Danes have such faith in each other or is it just what everybody says?"

Then I always provide the example that in Denmark you can buy a tray of stawberries along the roadside and pay by putting a coin in a cigar box next to the strawberries. This should be the answer to their question, Assosicate Professor Christian Bjornskov of the Institute of Economics smiles.

Christian Bjornskov is part of a new interdisciplinary research project at the Institute of Economics of the Aarhus University Business School and at the Institute of Political Science of the Aarhus University. The project goal is to understand why some countries have very trusting populations while other countries have very little trusting populations.

In Denmark 66 percent believe that other people can be trusted, in France it is 22 percent and in Brazil it is 3 percent. Therefore, we have now started studying the secret of this.

And that is where the Vikings come in, Bjornskov informs. The Vikings traded large quantities over long distances. A Viking in Ribe could not be sure that the man in Reykjavik would pay for the merchandise. Trust was the only security.

The more confidence you have, the easier it is to solve collective commercial problems or complex logistics tasks.

Denmark World's Happiest Country

According to Reuters article July 1st 2008 Denmark should be a very happy country according to a recent survey.

The article goes like this:

WASHINGTON – Denmark, with its democracy, social equality and peaceful atmosphere, is the happiest country in the world, researchers said on Monday.

Zimbabwe, torn by political and social strife, is the least happy, while the world's richest nation, the United States, ranks 16th.

Overall, the world is getting happier, according to the U.S. government-funded World Values Survey, done regularly by a global network of social scientists.

It found increased happiness from 1981 to 2007 in 45 of 52 countries analyzed.

"I strongly suspect that there is a strong correlation between peace and happiness," said Ronald Inglehart, a political scientist at the University of Michigan's Institute for Social Research, who directed the study.

And, said Inglehart, there is a strong correlation between happiness and democracy.

"Denmark is the happiest country in the world in our ratings," Inglehart said in an audio statement released by the National Science Foundation, which paid for the analysis. "Denmark is prosperous - - not the richest country in the world but it is prosperous".

Puerto Rico and Colombia also rank highly, along with Northern Ireland, Iceland, Switzerland, Ireland, the Netherlands, Canada and Sweden.

"Though by no means the happiest country in the world, from a global perspective the United States looks pretty good," Inglehart said. "The country is not only prosperous; it ranks relatively high in gender equality, tolerance of ethnic and social diversity and has high levels of political freedom."

The survey, first done in 1981, has kept to two simple questions:

"Taking all things together, would you say you are very happy, rather happy, not very happy, not at all happy?" And, "All things considered, how satisfied are you with your life as a whole these days?"


Writing in the journal Perspectives on Psychological Science, Inglehart's team said they have surveyed 350,000 people.

"Ultimately, the most important determinant of happiness is the extent to which people have free choice in how to live their lives," Inglehart said.

TEACHER: Clyde, your composition on 'My Dog' is exactly the same as your brother's.


